The big winners here are Wisconsin Special Olympic Athletes. The La Crosse community alone raised \$165,000, bringing the total dollar amount raised statewide to nearly \$1.9 million. The money goes to fund training and competition for over 10,000 athletes with special needs, who compete in 18 different sports year-round.

Building Improvements Ensuring a Safer Workplace

At Empire there are three (3) exits that are below ground level.

- Clean Room #1, Building K
- Ink Department, Building Q
- Exit across from Electrical Room, Building N

During the winter these exits become drifted in with snow and ice. Removing snow and ice from these areas can be very labor intensive. The rest of the year, when we have heavy rains, water floods under the doors in these areas and floods into the plant. Both of these situations create undesirable hazards.

Empire's Safety Committee has recognized these hazardous areas. This Spring roofs will be constructed over all three exits, and the lack of a safety railing at ground level Clean Room #1 will also be addressed.

WXOW TV19 Covers Empire's Outstanding Safety Record

ONALASKA, Wisconsin (WXOW)-- For a little more than three years now, no employee at Empire has used lost time or workers' comp. In September 2000 the company created a safety committee to combat their high risk insurance costs. The committee is made up of current employees, who hold each other accountable for wearing

proper eye, ear and hand protection. Employees are rewarded for every 100 injury free days. They receive a catered meal and are entered in a \$2,000 dollar drawing. "It has been a great success. Our customers have come in and said how did you do this? It is not me, it is thanks to our employees," said Empire VP Jim Schwinefus.

"They are giving back for us being safe. So, I think a lot of people try to be safe so that they can get the rewards," said Deb Wolfe. Empire said their safety initiative has lowered their high risk insurance policy. Empire has set a company record of 1275 days.

Heated Competition at Empire Charity Chili Cook-Off

Insanely, appetizing smells drifted through Empire on the morning of Wednesday, January 26, 2011. Employees came bearing crock-pots of all shapes and sizes, filled to the brim, with an amazing assortment of chili. The owner of Empire, Jim Brush, matched 50% of the total raised by employees. Employees raised \$292.00 and as promised, Jim contributed \$146.00. The grand total donated to Place of Grace was \$438.00, plus 25 lbs. of donated food.

Six local celebrities were invited to taste and evaluate the entries. Anchor woman, Amy DuPont and meteorologist, Dan Breeden came from WXOW TV 19. Local radio host from Classic Rock 100.1 FM, Kelly Wilde, loaned us their taste buds. The general manager from the La Crosse Loggers, Chris Goodell, took time from his busy schedule to help Empire. Ciatti's Italian Restaurant owner, Vince Valdez, lent his food expertise, sampling numerous chilis. Rounding out the field of judges, was the house manager for Place of Grace, Michael Kruger.

Judges and employees found it difficult to single out winners from the 22 different varieties entered in the cook-off. Scores were very tight. There was one tie and others won by less than four tenths of a percent in a given category.

First place winners received an award plaque, \$25.00, and bragging rights for the best chili at Empire. Second and third place winners also received certificates.

Once Called Quality Control, Now Called Quality Assurance

At one time it was known as Quality Control; with the changes and improvements taking place at Empire, it is now known as Quality Assurance. Quality Control and Quality Assurance are terms often misunderstood by production personnel. A simple way to remember the difference is that Quality Control checks the products themselves, while Quality Assurance concentrates on the processes used to create those products.

There are three steps to Quality Assurance:

- Control of documents
- Control of non-conformance
- Auditing the process

While quality control issues are being regulated by the supervisors in each department, quality assurance items will be handled by Empire's QA Department. These changes are a large factor in the ongoing process of lean manufacturing.

Empire has retained loss records since 1999. These loss records are tracked through internal losses, customer returns, and incomplete jobs. Records

are categorized by departments and type of non-conformance. Losses have been reduced by 50% since 1999, because we are able to determine which areas suffer high impact losses, and immediately address those issues at hand. When a job is stopped or put on hold, concerns are categorized to discover areas which require improvement, this can help avoid a costly loss.


Through our Lean Steering Committee,

supervisors are assigned tasks that address areas in need of improvement. These tasks are put on a policy deployment schedule given a time line in which to be completed. Doing this at an upper management level, allows Empire to

assemble a team, and obtain needed tools or equipment to address quality assurance issues.

An internal marketing program will be implemented by Empire to keep focused on our Employee Incentive Program. The message is positively aimed at taking ownership of Quality Control and Quality Assurance.

Cutting Your Energy Costs

Illuminating facts about fluorescent bulbs

We really can Change the World by changing just one light bulb. If each household changed one standard bulb for one compact fluorescent bulb, California could:

- Reduce energy use by up to 616 million kilowatt hours of electricity in one year. That's enough energy to light all the households in Sacramento for 690 days - or almost two years!
- Save \$74.7 million a year on household electricity bills.
- · Reduce garbage by keeping up to a billion (yes, a billion) bulbs out of the trash. Each fluorescent bulb can last up to 10 times longer than an ordinary bulb, so think of all those bulbs that won't be thrown away.

- Change the bulbs in lights that you use the most, such as the kitchen ceiling lights, living room lamps, bathroom vanity, or porch light
- Keep your home cooler in the summer by using fluorescent lighting. A fluorescent bulb generates 70 percent less heat than a regular bulb.


WHAT'S NEW IN TOWN **Empire Screen Printing Art Department**
