INTRODUCING THE GRAPHIUM BY: JENNIFER SCHLOESSER

After months of research, Empire acquired the Graphium: a hybrid of flexo and digital printer from FUJIFILM. Delivered at the end of February of 2018, operators, engineers, R&D members, and artists trained on new software, color management, and technical aspects to run this new press.

The learning curve is steep, but the Graphium will be an important asset for Empire and our customers once all aspects are ironed out. This press will expand our business, offering customers high-speed digital output, and the ability to run continuous roll graphics. An additional flexo station equips the press for clear coats, metallics, and back-printing options.

Fujifilm released a press release in September announcing our

addition of the Graphium.

Below is the Press Release written by William Rongey at Fujifilm.

"Hanover Park, Ill., September 24, 2018 – FUJIFILM North America Corporation, Graphic Systems Division's Graphium UV digital hybrid inkjet press for labels, packaging and specialty print extends capabilities at Onalaska, Wisconsin-based Empire Screen Printing.

The Graphium opens up the door to a different digital output method for us, and additional revenues,' said Jennifer Schloesser, creative director, Empire Screen Printing. We are now able to enter new markets we previously were not able to consider.'

SAFETY NEWS BY: AMY BETTIS

Advanced OSHA training for safety committee members Keith Cook and Amy Bettis in August 2018 has heightened our safety awareness. We complete our safety walks through our production facilities with "OSHA eyes." This additional education has made us more proactive in protecting employees.

Older equipment is being re-evaluated and upgraded with safety features and new guarding (e.g., core cutter in flexo). Walking and working surfaces are being improved both inside and outside our production facilities (e.g., exits and courtyard in downstairs conference room). Building improvements such as new overhead doors by LVS to aid in noise reduction were added in screen making.

Empire also improved access to first aid by adding five stand-alone eyewash stations in the machine shop, SVS, doming, digital, and shipping. A sixth stand-alone eyewash station has been ordered and planned for installation in LVS-Cell 2. October 2018 completed our second year of testing, providing essential comparison data to 2017 for these employee health and safety programs.

These continued efforts contribute greatly to our safety record and bottom line. Empire is proud of our employees who have met this 1065-day milestone. That's almost three years with no lost time accidents. This achievement was celebrated with a catered meal on Nov. 28th and safety raffle. Keep up the awesome work and keep moving our company safely forward.

The walking stick was presented to Jim and Cindy Brush, along with a group of Empire employees at the Western Technical College's Lunda Center on September 25th, 2018.









INTRODUCING THE GRAPHIUM (CONTINUED) BY: JENNIFER SCHLOESSER

Graphium represents the next generation of UV inkjet press for labels, packaging and specialty print. The press allows print service providers to fully embrace complex label, packaging and specialty jobs that simply aren't achievable with standalone conventional or inkjet presses. It makes converting short to medium print jobs profitable, as the press streamlines workflow, requires less setup material, less ink/varnish/laminate, provides lower running waste and eliminates overruns. Furthermore, it is one of the only modular digital inkjet presses offering the option to integrate true flexo and finishing stations for hybrid production and conversion, in a single pass – greatly expanding the opportunities that can be converted.

The print quality on the Graphium extends our capabilities of our screen printing when it comes to printing four color process, fine lines, and perfect register jobs,' said John Freismuth, president, Empire Screen Printing. 'The Graphium is going to change the way print goes to market. I've heard many colleagues say 'digital isn't fast enough' and 'digital isn't outdoor-durable,' and with Graphium, you get both; it's fast and the output is outdoor durable.'

"Empire Screen Printing is one of the top print service providers for the polycarbonate market, and with the Graphium, new advantages with this innovative digital press allow the company to excel.

We haven't found any other press that's cost-effective and provides durable labels for outputting solid color polycarbonate,' says Freismuth. They were either too slow or (the digital ink) didn't stick. We are now producing decorative polycarb elements that are directly applied to commercial grade and residential appliances, along with exercise equipment. Many of our jobs require a lot of white ink for the opacity, and the Graphium allows us to do this very well.'

"Complex artwork regularly arrives at Empire Screen Printing, and the traditional screen printing process wasn't able to handle the requirements demanded of clients.

The Graphium allows us to successfully work with designers and companies looking for perfect registration," said Freismuth. "Screen printing hasn't been able to offer that, and with the introduction of digital, we can manage complex files at speeds faster than ever. With the Graphium we have the ability to output multiple jobs efficiently and cost effectively.'

"In 1960, Empire began in a garage in La Crosse, Wisconsin, as a one-man operation. Though their roots are in screen printing, the company has expanded into flexographic and digital printing with their newest solution being the acquisition of the Graphium. Empire Screen Printing provides output for well-known industries within automotive, aircraft, electronics, food and beverages, government, sporting goods and retail. Empire Screen Printing recognizes the importance of its carbon footprint, and as a Wisconsin Green Tier Company, it's committed to go above and beyond local, state, and EPA environmental standards."




KOREAN WAR VETERAN LAID TO REST BY: JESSICA KAMROWSKI

I've been to my share of funerals, including that of my own father, but none have been as touching as the funeral for my Uncle Leonard.

Leonard V. Purkapile was born August 11, 1924. He served our great country in World War II from April, 1943 until December, 1945. Leonard then re-enlisted in November, 1948. He was a Corporal of Company E, 2nd Battalion, 35th Infantry Regiment, 25th Infantry Division during the Korean War. He was listed as Missing in Action while fighting the enemy in North Korea on November 28, 1950 and was presumed dead on December 31, 1953.

As a child, I remember our family gathering at the kitchen table to view memorabilia kept in an old cardboard box in the attic. Included were letters written to my mother from Leonard (her brother) while he was abroad. Everyone became guiet then, maybe out of reverence. The same questions popped up every year: What happened to Leonard? Was he really dead? It was so hard to believe that he was gone, as no body or remains were ever found to be brought home and buried. That is, until earlier this year.

My mother, Jeanette, submitted her DNA to the Defense Department back in 2008 in hopes of helping find and identify his remains. Lo and behold, some of Leonard's



I could hardly believe it! After all these years, Leonard was finally coming home. His remains were flown from Hawaii to Chicago and were driven to Lancaster in April. A funeral with full military honors was held in Lancaster on April 26.

I was amazed by the huge family and military presence at the funeral. I think every veteran in the surrounding area was there to show their respect. It was when the first serviceman leading the procession marched in, turned, and slowly raised his arm as he saluted Leonard's casket, that I lost my composure and started to cry. It was a profound display of honor and gratitude.

There was a lengthy funeral procession to the cemetery. Once there, the military



presence was even greater. The mournful bugle played "Taps," the 21 gun salute sounded, and the flag was meticulously folded and presented to Leonard's daughter, Delores Hall, who was an infant in 1950. The whole ceremony was greatly moving.


I am so thankful that my mother had the foresight to submit her DNA. Had she not done that, Leonard would still be scattered amongst the many boxes of remains waiting to be identified.
