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SCREEN MAKING IMPROVEMENTS BY: MIKE WAKEEN

The screen making department has gone through many changes in 2021. It has been challenging to meet the needs of our internal customers, so we explored different ways to improve.

One of the ways we are improving in screen making is through automation. Screen makers have to handle screens up to 30 times, requiring an employee to retrieve them from the press, wipe off the ink, clean it, wash it, prepare it for new emulsion, image, develop, wash out, dry, tape, block out, and inspect to have a screen ready to return to the press. This involved lifting and moving frames multiple times, with some as large as $60'' \times 79''$, and direct contact with chemicals. Automation helps reduce the number of touches per screen and makes the processes more efficient and consistent.

Early in 2021, we purchased a Dane 250 to wash the ink and emulsion off screens automatically. Now, we simply remove the tape from the screen, stage it in a 10-screen feed magazine, and the Dane automatically washes the ink out, removes the emulsion, and then gives a final rinse before releasing it into a clean screen magazine. The frames can then be inspected, hazed, and degreased for coating. This is a much safer and cleaner process for our employees.

Tips for saving on your energy cost:

Who needs energy? I know I need lots of it. Kid(s) running you in circles, leaving lights on in their wake, and driving them to and from different events. What about work stress? Early mornings, long days, leaving you fatigued, tired, and exhausted? Never feel like you have enough energy to get through your day?

That's an energy crisis. Sometimes we're so wrapped up in the day-to-day activities, we find it hard to make improvements when it comes to expenses. As winter comes along, how can we keep our energy costs down? Being green while saving green can help, just with a little attention into what is costing you money.

According to the US Energy Information Administration, a typical family spends more than \$1,400 per year on utilities. However, with inflation rates, energy use will cost more this winter than the previous years. With a few tweaks to your energy use, you could save money and reduce the impact on your pocketbook.

Here are ten items to check that can effectively save you money:

- 1. Check seals on windows, doors, and appliances. Windows are a significant portion of your energy bill. Depending on the size of your home, 15% 20% of your heat could escape through the windows.
- 2. Fix the leaks. Check water faucets, foundation cracks, and ductwork. Leaks mean money, and fixing ductwork improves the efficiency of heating and cooling systems.
- 3. Give your thermostat a nudge. Programming your thermostat to reduce your temperature by 10 15° while you sleep or when you're away could save up to 10% on your bills.
- 4. Adjust your fridge and freezer temperature. The ideal temperature for the fridge is 38°, and the freezer is between 0° and 5 degrees.
- 5. Swap out your lightbulbs. Look for Energy Star labels when selecting lightbulbs. Switch to LED in high-use areas.
- 6. Use smart power strips. Some electronic gadgets never truly power off. The little

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blue lights are always receiving power, even when they're not in use. Plug these electronics into a smart power strip, which cuts off the current when the devices are idle. Turning off your computer's monitor can save as much as two-thirds of a computer's energy.

The next four items relate to water reduction. According to the department of energy, hot water usage is the second-largest expense powering most homes. Cutting back on hot water can make a sizable dent in our overall energy bill.

- 7. Take shorter showers. Trimming two minutes off your shower time will save on energy and up to five gallons of water.
- 8. Replace your shower head. Look for WaterSense labels when purchasing a new shower head, an efficient shower head can reduce your water usage by 2,700 gallons per year.
- 9. Don't wash clothes in hot water. Using warm or cold water will cut your pre-load energy use by at least half.
- 10. Adjust the water heater temperature. Default heaters are typically set at 140 degrees. Lowering to 120 degrees can reduce your water heating costs up to 10 percent. Going out of town? Lower to the lowest setting.

For more questions or help finding ways to improve, contact your local energy provider to have them perform an energy audit on your home. Many times, this is done for free, and they can help identify potential areas that could save you money. Your energy provider may also provide rebates for energy-saving home improvements, such as HVAC systems and window replacements that will provide energy-efficient upgrades. When purchasing new appliances or permanent upgrades to your home, look for Energy Star products and do research for the best products that meet your needs.

Getting back to our initial energy crisis mentioned, try these helpful tips to boost your energy at home and at work: eat your breakfast, practice yoga techniques, sing your favorite tune, drink plenty of water, eat a handful of almonds or peanuts, smell some cinnamon or peppermint, exercise—a 10-minute walk might be just what you need. Get some sunshine, refuel your body with healthy snacks, and hang out with upbeat friends.

GREEN MASTERS PROGRAM

Empire received the Green Masters Program Certification from the Wisconsin Sustainable Business Council for our sustainability initiatives in 2021. Way to go, everyone!



SCREEN MAKING IMPROVEMENTS (CONTINUED)

To support the use of the chemicals within the Dane, we purchased a new still to recycle ink wash. This practice is in line with our sustainability policy, to incorporate activities and procedures that will reduce our impact on the environment as well as improve the quality of health and wellness of the employees. We are looking into recycling all the water in screen making for future improvements.

We also introduced a CST laser exposure unit. The original process required physically loading and unloading the exposure unit, doing the same with the developer, and again moving it to the dryer. This is a considerable amount of screen handling and lifting.

In preparation for this equipment, we added a 10-screen feed magazine, automatic developer, and a drying magazine. This automated process allows us to load the exposure magazine, and the rest is automated. Screens go directly to the inspection area from there. This removed eight handling steps per screen by implementing this new process. With a full magazine, this eliminates 80 handling steps within the process.

Our goals are to continue automating and improving the screen making area, making it a safer and more efficient process.

WTC TRAINING FOR MANAGERS BY: MIKE WAKEEN

Twenty of our managers and supervisors got the opportunity to go through WWTC Emerging Leaders Training. The training was held on-site at Empire, with classes every other Friday. Instructors came prepared and ready to teach, and we all came excited and ready to learn. The instructors were terrific, with classes that were hands-on and interactive. Everyone participated and took something from each and every lesson.

The first subject was "Communicating in Today's Work Environment," going over different and more effective means of listening and communicating messages clearly.

Second was "Embracing and Activating the Value of Teamwork," showing ways to promote involvement and showing us that we can accomplish any challenge when we're all a part of the solution.

Third class was "Emotional Intelligence." We learned how our emotions and reactions to certain situations can cause them to escalate or improve, going over methods to manage difficult scenarios with employees and promoting growth.

Fifth class was "Cultivating Culture," showing us how it's important for each of us to lead based on our mission statement and core values.


The last topic was "Conflict Resolution." This showed how to work through issues and conflicts with coworkers and employees, using clear communication about expected behavior and outcomes.


